



Habitat leads Community Collaboration in N. Nashville

Habitat for Humanity of Greater Nashville is excited to announce it is leading a community revitalization in north Nashville to renovate the historic Parkwood Community Club ballfields, help establish a 59-acre Metro Park, and build 26 quality affordable Habitat homes. This represents a \$12 million dollar investment in District 2.

Parkwood was the epicenter of community baseball and softball says Charles Starks, CEO of Music City Center.

Due to the aging condition of the fields and COVID, the number of youth participation has dropped significantly to under 100 from a pre-pandemic enrollment of 300.

At the time, Parkwood had 26 coaches and nine teams who played in two leagues: Dixie Youth and Little League, from February through July. It is run by a volunteer Board and is a 501c3 organization.
